White House Conference on Fallout Protection

Suggested Joint Press Statement by the Government

This meeting, held with President Eisenhower and the military, and the participation of members of his administration was of major and significant importance. We wish all of our citizens could have participated in it.

The statement of the President, the remarks of the Director of the Central Intelligence Agency, the Secretary of State, the Secretary of Defense, and the Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, collectively established the fact that fallout protection for American citizens, in the event of a nuclear attack, is not only a matter of national security but is an urgent requirement of national policy.

If our foreign policy is to be effective, if our foreign negotiations are to be successful in assuring peace, if our military dependence is to be effective and our military strength is to be maintained, if the American people are to have the security and will to resist nuclear blackmail, if our children are to survive in the event of a nuclear attack, it is unthinkable and a desperate matter to have no plan.

for each of these reasons, the highest protection of our citizens is imperative.

We are satisfied from the presentation we heard today that, while there will be many problems, a very high degree of protection from fallout can be achieved, that it is achievable now and achievable at a cost within the means of our people and nation.

Our immediate task, as Governors, is to cooperate with Federal officials, to agree upon a program of state and local action which, together with programs of Federal support, will make fallout a serious threat for our citizens as readily as soon as possible.

To this task we shall now turn with confidence that, by discharging this responsibility successfully, we will contribute a significant contribution to our nation's quest for a more meaningful peace and a peace founded on liberty, justice, and freedom for all men.
